Identity reflects elements of a profession.

- Responsibilities
- Values
- Ethical Standards



Situated Identity Theory

Identity is contingent on positionality and situation.

Community of Practice Framework

- Part of Situated Learning Theory
- Communities of practice are groups which create groups of practitioners.
- Communities of practice are defined by:
 - Domain: The area of interest and the problems which need to be solved
 - Community: The people involved and their interactions
 - Practice: The body of knowledge created by practice and the application of that body of knowledge.



Positive Distinctiveness


- A component of Social Identity Theory
- Members of a group engage in behaviours which make the group more unique
- The self-esteem of the members is tied to the distinctiveness of the group





Sub-identities

Sub-identities are identities which exist within a larger identity group





Other influences on identity

- Organisational Identity
- Geographic and cultural factors
- Personal identity
- Boundary Permeability



Community Paramedics and Identity

Community paramedics exist within a larger paramedic identity

Element	
Roles	Focus on preventative and complex care
Responsibilities	Higher degree of personal responsibility for patientsDifferent goals and metrics of success
Values	 Strong focus on person centred care Strong focus on quality of life Strong focus on patient experience
Standards	More personal relationships with patientsStrong focus on quality of decision makingStrong focus on problem solving



Community Paramedics and Identity

- Community paramedics are situated differently than most paramedics within the practice environment
 - Greater emphasis on interprofessional practice
 - Different expectations from patients
 - Different situated learning which supports different elements of identity
 - Permeability of boundaries and interprofessional practice means shared identity with other health professionals



Community Paramedics and Identity

Community paramedicine is a community of practice within paramedicine more broadly

Element	
Domain	Specific body of knowledgeProblems are unique within paramedicineSituated learning
Community	 Majority of community paramedics choose community paramedicine Collaboration between individuals to share knowledge
Practice	 Evolving practice Different practice activities Different practice environments Diversity of practice



Sub-identities

- Community paramedics are, by definition, paramedics and exist within paramedicine
- Community paramedics exist as a sub-identity within paramedicine
- Positive distinctiveness can be shown through
 - Different uniform
 - Different professional language
 - Different values, behaviours and focus
- Further sub-identities can be underpinned by
 - Situated practice
 - Specialisation
 - Organisational, geographic or cultural elements
